SMSA Reaches \$5 Million in Scholarship Awards

Building America's Future Gala Recognizes Students, Business and Military Leaders

The Seabee Memorial Scholarship Association (SMSA) celebrated its 2017-2018 scholarship recipients and recognized distinguished leaders from the business and military sectors at its Building America's Future Gala on Sept. 23 in Washington, D.C.



Rear Admiral Mike Giorgione, CEC, USN (Ret.) and chairman of SMSA announced that the association has awarded a record-breaking \$5 million in scholarships to more than 2,800 high-performing SMSA children and grandchildren since 1972. This year, SMSA awarded 89 scholarships totaling \$293,500.



Dr. Arlene Garingo, 2017 SMSA Distinguished Scholar Award recipient, delivered remarks on behalf of former scholarship recipients during the Gala. Dr. Garingo is an assistant professor of Clinical Pediatrics at

the University of Southern California and an attending neonatologist at Children's Hospital in Los Angeles. She participates in several medical humanitarian trips to the Indo-Asia Pacific annually.

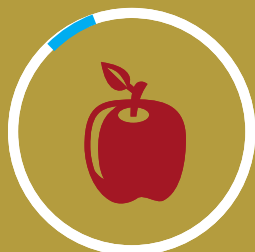

Beatrice Greeson was one of three students to accept the 2016 Presidential Award for Extraordinary Efforts to Combat Trafficking in Persons on behalf of Students Opposing Slavery (SOS).

The award was presented by Secretary of State John Kerry at the annual meeting of President Obama's Interagency Task Force to Monitor and Combat Trafficking in Persons on October 24th, 2016 at the White House. SOS is a student-led grassroots organization founded with the intention of raising awareness of human trafficking and empowering youth leaders within the the anti-human trafficking movement.

"It is my goal to use the lessons I've learned in college and military communities around the world to engage the larger community in issues relating to human dignity and equal access. The scholarship will allow me to pursue my goal."

Honoring Seabee Service



Over four decades ago, the Seabee Memorial Scholarship Association (SMSA) raised the money to build the Seabee Memorial in Arlington National Cemetery – a most fitting place to honor Seabee veterans.

On May 27, 1974, Admiral Ben Moreell, USN (Ret.) – Father of the Navy Seabees – dedicated the Seabee Memorial to all those who had served with U.S. Naval Construction Battalions.

Admiral Moreell's words still resonate with Seabees today:

"High morale, expert skills, versatile ingenuity, strong devotion to duty and deep empathy for the needy, are the hallmarks of their record. . .In war and in peace, they have maintained their high reputation as builders, fighters and humanitarians."

Seabee Veterans know this, too, and bear this legacy proudly.

On Veterans Day, Rear Admiral Robert C. Marlay, CEC, USN (Ret.), an SMSA volunteer and board member, represented SMSA as our nation remembered the contributions of those who have served in the Civil Engineer Corps and Seabee community.

"We seek to honor Seabee veterans every year in one more and sustaining way – by awarding scholarships to their children and grandchildren. We have found it to be a powerful enabler toward realizing great personal potential. Later in life, our scholarship recipients contribute, in turn, to greater service to society and to our country."

Building Futures: Internship Opportunities

support the academic ambitions of our scholars, we want to ensure they have the support and resources necessary to transition into the workforce. Why Not? – My Summer as an HR Intern

My dad was in the Navy Seabees and retired as a chief petty officer with 22 years of service in the Navy. Before going off to college, my mom heard about the Seabee Memorial Scholarship Association (SMSA), which provides scholarships to children and grandchildren of Seabees and Civil Engineer Corps officers seeking a college education. I applied and was chosen as a recipient of one of the 2014 scholarships. I am so grateful for having this scholarship. Without it, I would not be able to attend the college of my dreams.

Not only do I receive an annual scholarship, but I was also notified through SMSA that Siemens Government Technologies (SGT) was offering internship opportunities this summer and that it is interested in having SMSA scholars in the program. I applied, interviewed, and received an internship through SGT. I am so grateful to both SGT and the SMSA for the experiences I have had this summer, which I would have never had without either company's support.

We got to meet each SGT executive, hear more about what type of work they do and ask literally any question we wanted to know. Meeting the CEO, Barbara Humpton, on the very first day made a huge impression on me. She is so down-to-earth and personable. I knew with that sort of leadership, working for SGT was going to be absolutely wonderful. After learning about the company and the type of work SGT does, we had a team building event where we "Saved the White House" at the DC Escape Room. This was a great bonding experience for me and the other interns.



After training, we all got to work. Being the human resources intern was really cool. I got a behind-the-scenes view of almost all aspects of the business – from talent acquisition to job classification, to sitting in on a phone interview observing the candidate selection process. I learned about employee development and performance management, as well as how different it is to work with a labor union. I learned the do's and don'ts of being a manager including managing your time well and being able to coach your peers. I also received advice on behavioral

interviewing questions and techniques.

I was mainly in charge of two projects. One project was helping to collect data for SGT's On-Boarding program, which we were digitizing this summer. I was in charge of meeting with all of the department heads and collecting the necessary documents that inform new hires for successful employment at SGT. I met with the accounting manager, the senior proposal manager, and the senior project developer.

The other project I spearheaded was our Skills and Competencies Program. This project started a couple years ago, but was never rolled out to the managers. I helped create the roll-out and implementation plan for this company-wide initiation. The program has three main purposes – employee development and finding skill gaps within each of the teams, talent assessment within the organization along with incoming talent and increasing employee engagement and assisting in employee cross-functional moves. I really enjoyed having the opportunity to be responsible for the program from start to finish and growing it from the ground up. I am really proud of how far I was able to take this project.

I've had an amazing summer and learned invaluable skills and life lessons while working at SGT that I will carry with me into my career. I received hands-on experience and was really able to make a difference in the company. I am so grateful to have had a manager who helped me develop myself as an individual. I have learned and grown so much this summer. I am so thankful to have worked at SGT, where they value all of their employees. One of my new life mottos after this summer is "Why Not?" Why not move somewhere you've never been? Why not learn how HR supports every aspect of the company? Why not have dinner at the CEO's house? Why not help with an engineering contract? Why not engage, observe and absorb everything you can? Why not? This summer has been awesome, but only because I asked myself "Why not?".

RADM Benjamin Montoya, CEC, USN (Ret.) Scholarship Created



In October, SMSA announced the creation of a scholarship in memory of RADM Benjamin F. Montoya, CEC, USN (Ret.) RADM Montoya served as the Commander Naval Facilities Engineering Command/Chief of Civil Engineers from August 1987 until October 1989.

RADM Montoya led a storied life filled with high achievement and excellence, the breaking down of barriers and a whole host of “firsts” for himself and others. It was filled with a tremendous amount of hard work, adventure, and laughter.

His was a life shaped not only by a strong and loving family but also by the opportunities and benefits of education.

A graduate of the U.S. Naval Academy, RADM Montoya also earned a Bachelor of Science in Engineering from the Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute and a Master of Science from Georgia Institute of Technology. Montoya became the director Navy Environmental Programs, and is credited with kick-starting the Navy’s environmental movement. After his retirement, Montoya became President and CEO of the Public Service Company of New Mexico.



RADM Montoya’s professional legacy is substantial. However, if you talk to people who knew him, it is the personal stories and interactions that really tell the story. Admiral Montoya was one of those men with that rare gift of being able to look at a situation and understand all the possibilities and consequences, or look at a person and perceive the depths of his or her character and the potential that rested within.

Ben Montoya helped countless numbers of people realize their potential. RADM Montoya exemplified the ideals, objectives and spirit of the Seabee Memorial Scholarship Association: scholarship and mentorship. He was a man who, throughout his life, helped lift up those he believed had untapped potential. He was a living example of one who benefitted from similar support. It is very fitting that the Association recognize his legacy with a named and endowed scholarship.

Starting in 2018, SMSA will award the RADM Benjamin Montoya Scholarship.
